From the Junior Vice Commander


Shipmates,

I've been busy with personal affairs but would be remiss not to revisit this vital part of our history, the place where it all began.

On September 6, 1776, the first functioning submarine, called the Turtle, attacked the HMS Eagle anchored in New York Harbor. Designed by Saybrook native and Yale graduate David Bushnell, the Turtle was a one-man vessel that submerged by admitting water into the hull and surfaced by pumping it out by hand. The oak carved egg-shaped submarine was armed with a torpedo made from a keg of powder that would be attached to an enemy ship's hull and gave Americans a secret weapon against the British—one that could potentially destroy British ships in New York Harbor.

On the night of September 6 and 7, the Turtle, operated by Army volunteer Ezra Lee, made its way through the dark waters of the Harbor and conducted the attack. Problems arose, however, when the boring device operated from inside the submarine failed to penetrate the ship's hull. The torpedo was eventually abandoned and Lee emerged unhurt. The abandoned torpedo detonated about an hour after it was released but did no harm. The Turtle would attack again, only to be discovered. It was subsequently captured by the British, and sunk with the sloop upon which it was being transported.

It wasn't exactly a success but naval warfare was forever changed and showed that the submarine could become a potent asset defending the nation and controlling the seas.

Boats Lost in October

USS O-5 (SS-66): Lost on October 29, 1923 with the loss of 3 men when rammed and sunk by SS Ababgarez off the Panama Canal.

USS S-44 (SS-155): Lost on Oct 7, 1943 with the loss



of 56 men when it was sunk off Paramushiru, Kuriles. S-44 was on her 5th war patrol after attacking a target thought to be a merchant on the surface, S-44 found herself in a losing gun battle with a heavily armed Japanese destroyer. Two men were taken prisoner and survived

the war.

USS Wahoo (SS-238): Lost on Oct 11, 1943 with the



loss of 80 men near La Perouse Strait. Under command of one of the great sub skippers of World War II, LCDR "Mush" Morton, Wahoo was on her 7th war patrol. Wahoo had won a Presidential Unit Citation and ranks 5th in the number of

enemy ships sunk. She was lost to depth charges dropped by a Japanese patrol aircraft.

USS Dorado (SS-248): Lost on Oct 12, 1943 with the



loss of 77 men when she was sunk in the western Atlantic near Cuba. Newly commissioned, she had departed New London and was enroute to Panama. She may have been sunk by a U.S. patrol plane that received faulty instructions regarding bombing restriction

areas or a German U-boat that was in the vicinity.

USS Seawolf (SS-197): Lost on Oct 3, 1944 with the



loss of 83 officers and men and 17 US Army troops when she was sunk just north of Moritai by USS Rowell, a Destroyer Escort (DE). In this tragic error, Rowell mistook Seawolf for a Japanese submarine that had just sunk another Destroyer.

Seawolf ranks 7th for enemy ships sunk.

USS Escolar (SS-294): Lost on Oct 17, 1944 with the



loss of 82 men. She was on her 1st war patrol and was most likely lost to a mine somewhere in the Yellow Sea.

USS Shark II (SS-314): Lost on Oct 24, 1944 with the



loss of 87 when she was sunk near Hainan. The second boat to carry this name during World War II, she was on her 3rd war patrol. Shark was sunk by escorts after attacking and sinking a lone freighter. Compounding the tragedy, it

turned out that the freighter had 1,800 U.S. POW's on board.



USS Darter (SS-227): Lost on Oct 24, 1944 when she



became grounded on Bombay Shoal off Palawan and was then destroyed to prevent her falling into enemy hands intact. The entire crew was rescued by USS Dace. Winner of one Navy Unit Commendation, Darter had

sunk a heavy cruiser and damaged another and went aground while attempting an "end around" on an enemy formation in hopes of getting in an attack on a battleship.

USS Tang (SS-306): Lost on Oct 25, 1944 with the



loss of 78 men in the Formosa Strait. Tang was on her 5th war patrol. Tang ranks 2nd in the number of ships sunk and 4th in tonnage, and had won two Presidential Unit Citations. During a daring night surface

attack, Tang was lost to a circular run by one of her own torpedoes. Nine of the crew were taken prisoner, including CDR. O'Kane and five who had gained the surface from her final resting place 180 feet below. All survived the war, and CDR O'Kane was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor.

October Historic Events

13 October 1775 - The Continental Congress votes for two vessels to be fitted out and armed with 10 carriage guns, a proportional number of swivel guns, and crews of 80 then sent out on a cruise of three months to intercept transports carrying munitions and stores to the British army in America. This legislation, out of which the Continental Navy grew, constitutes the birth of the U.S. Navy.

8 October 1842 - Commodore Lawrence Kearny, commanding the East Indian Squadron, sends a letter to the Viceroy of China urging American merchants in China be granted the same treaty privileges as the British. As a result of his letter, Chinese ports are opened to American ships. These agreements are formalized by Caleb Cushing in the Treaty of Wangxia in 1844.

16 October 1885 - Capt. Alfred Thayer Mahan becomes the superintendent of the Naval War College at Newport, R.I.

19 October 1915 - The Naval Submarine Base at New London, Conn. is established.

5 October 1943 - USS Wahoo (SS 238) sinks the Japanese army transport Konron Maru in the Tsushima Straits.

3 October 1944 - USS Shelton (DE 407) is sunk by Japanese submarine off Morotai Island, Indonesia. During anti-submarine operations, USS Richard M. Rowell (DE 403) accidentally sinks USS Seawolf (SS 197), which is transporting U.S. Army personnel to the east coast of Samar. There are no survivors among the more than 100 crew and passengers.




18 October 1944 - USS Bluegill (SS 242) and USS Raton (SS 270) attack a Japanese convoy in the South China Sea. Bluegill sinks the army cargo ships Arabia Maru and Chinsei Maru and freighter Hakushika Maru. Raton sinks the army cargo ships Taikai Maru and Shiranesan Maru.


22 October1951 - The first detonation, Able, takes place in the Operation Buster-Jangle nuclear tests. Uncle, the last of the seven tests, is detonated Nov. 29. Navy and Marine Corps observers and 3rd Marines take part in this Department of Defense operation.

25 October 2008 - Virginia class submarine USS New Hampshire (SSN 778) is commissioned at Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, Kittery, Maine.



Russia deploys S-400 missiles in Arctic

Russia has placed S-400 missile defence systems at the Novaya Zemlya archipelago as Moscow seeks to increase its military presence in the Arctic, the defence ministry said on Monday.

The surface to air-missile regiment of the Northern Fleet's air defence forces based on the archipelago's southern Yuzhny Island has been fully equipped with new S-400 systems, the fleet said.

The regiment was earlier equipped with S-300 systems, a previous version of the missile.

The S-400 is one of the most advanced missile defence systems in the world and can hit enemy targets at up to 400 Kilometres.

Over the past few years Russia has significantly upgraded its military infrastructure in the Arctic.

In addition to the Novaya Zemlya forces, the country has stationed troops in the Franz Josef Land, the New Siberian Islands and several other places.

Russia has increasingly asserted itself as an Arctic nation, proclaiming the region as a top priority due to its mineral riches and strategic importance.

<u>USS Nebraska Tests Four Trident II D5</u> <u>Missiles</u>

SAN DIEGO -- The U.S. Navy conducted four scheduled missile test flights of unarmed Trident II (D5) missiles from USS Nebraska (SSBN-739), an Ohio-class ballistic missile submarine, off the coast of Southern California this week.

The first two launches took place Sept. 4, and the last two were Sept. 6. All occurred before sunrise.

These test flights were part of a Commander Evaluation Test (CET) whose primary goal was to validate performance expectations of the life-extended Trident II (D5) strategic weapon system.

These launches mark 176 successful flights of the Trident II (D5) strategic weapon system. CETs and other flight tests are conducted on a recurring, scheduled basis to evaluate and ensure the continued reliability and accuracy of the system. The missile tests were not conducted in response to any ongoing world events.

"Our nation's sea-based deterrent has been a critical component of ournational security since the 1960s, and this week's launches continue to demonstrate the credibility and reliability of our life-extended missiles," said Vice Adm. Johnny R. Wolfe, director of the Navy's Strategic Systems Programs, the command responsible for the Navy's strategic weapons.

The Trident II (D5) strategic weapon system, originally designed with a life span to 2024, recently underwent a life extension that will keep it operational through the late 2040s. The life-extended missiles will serve for the remaining service life of U.S. Ohio-class and United Kingdom Vanguard-class SSBNs, and as the initial loadout for the U.S. Columbia-class and U.K. Dreadnought-class SSBNs.

The life extension program addressed potential aging and obsolescence issues. "The life extended missiles are now being deployed to the Fleet, but our work is not done," Wolfe said.



US Navy makes a major breakthrough in autonomous weaponry

LONDON — The U.S. Navy has achieved a major milestone in its efforts to autonomously combat one of the most persistent threats it faces, the service's deputy head of the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations' mine warfare office said Monday.

The Navy successfully demonstrated what's known as single-sortie mine hunting, which sends out an autonomous boat to sweep for mines with a sonar system, detect a mine- like object, classify it and then deploy another system that destroys the mine, according to Stephen Olson.

It's a significant achievement in the years long effort to "get the man out of the minefield" by deploying robots to perform a job traditionally performed by manned minesweepers and highly trained divers. Beyond the safety benefits, it also quickens the process. The successful test opens up the possibility of having a small cadre of human operators who can oversee whole packs of robots as they sweep minefields on their own.

"That single-sortied, detect-to-engage was a great example of something that would represent supervisory [control of unmanned systems]," Olson said. "It was a small group [of people] who oversaw the entire effort: Multiple systems were in operation together, working together and cueing each other."

When reached for comment on the successful test, the Navy would not divulge further details.

Russia's first sea-borne nuclear power plant arrives to its base

MOSCOW (Reuters) - Russia's first-floating nuclear power plant has arrived to its permanent base near an isolated Russian town across the Bering Strait from Alaska, Russian state nuclear energy company Rosatom said on Saturday.

Developed by Rosatom, the plant, known as "Akademik Lomonosov", set off on a 5,000 km (3,100 mile) journey on Aug. 23 through Arctic waters to reach the Chukotka region.

Rosatom said it aims to make the floating station operational by the year-end. It would become the world's northernmost nuclear power station.

The plant will replace a coal-fired power plant and an aging nuclear power plant supplying more than 50,000 people with electricity in Chukotka.

Rosatom has long planned to launch the seaborne power units, which, with their mobile, small capacity plants, are best suited to remote regions. It has said they can help the environment by reducing greenhouse gas emissions blamed for global warming.

The small plants were designed to make it possible to supply electricity to hard-to-reach areas of Russia. They can operate non-stop without the need for refueling for 3-5 years.

Environmental protection groups, including Greenpeace, have expressed their concerns over potential safety issues.

U.S. 2nd Fleet Flexes Arctic Operational Muscle

U.S. 2nd Fleet flexed its Arctic operational muscle this week by opening a temporary expeditionary Maritime Operations Center in Keflavik, Iceland as a Surface Action Group enters the North Atlantic.

The MOC embodies a mission Navy leadership has discussed since reestablishing 2nd Fleet more than a year ago — monitoring North Atlantic Russian submarine activity while also maintaining an Arctic presence. About

30 2nd Fleet staff members are working out of the MOCa cording to the service.

"Iceland is a key ally, and its strategic location in the North Atlantic provides a perfect opportunity to



test out our expeditionary MOC for the first time," Vice Adm. Andrew Lewis, the commander of 2nd Fleet, said in a statement.

"Operating out of Iceland reinforces our partnership while allowing us to practice operating in an expeditionary manner and test our ability to surge forward."

As ships assigned to the recently deployed surface action group enter the region, the MOC will take over command and control of their operations. The SAG was hastily formed and departed on Sep. 12, when it was clear Nimitz-class aircraft carrier USS Harry S. Truman (CVN-75) would not be able to deploy because of problems with its electrical distribution system.

The SAG includes Ticonderoga-class guided-missile cruiser USS Normandy (CG-60) and Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyers USS Lassen (DDG-82), USS Forrest Sherman (DDG-98) and USS Farragut (DDG-99).

Also deployed are aircraft from Helicopter Maritime Strike Squadron (HSM) 72, according to the Navy.

When ships deploy to the 2nd Fleet's area of responsibility, the staff handles operational and administrative authorities over the ships, aircraft and landing forces. The fleet conducts exercises and operations within the U.S. European Command area of responsibility as an expeditionary fleet.
